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

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EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

This Demographics Report, which was prepared for the U.S. Department of Defense (DoD), presents a synthesis of demographic information describing members and families in the military community in fiscal year 2013. Active Duty Service branches include DoD's Army, Navy, Marine Corps, and Air Force; and the Reserve components include DoD's Army National Guard, Army Reserve, Navy Reserve, Marine Corps Reserve, Air National Guard and Air Force Reserve, and DHS's Coast Guard Reserve.

Overview of Military Personnel

The total number of military personnel is over 3.6 million strong, including DoD Active Duty military personnel (1,370,329); DHS's Active Duty Coast Guard members (40,420); DoD Ready Reserve and DHS Coast Guard Reserve members (1,102,419); members of the Retired Reserve (214,938) and Standby Reserve (14,408); and DoD appropriated and non-appropriated fund civilian personnel (874,054). DoD's Active Duty and DHS's Coast Guard Active Duty members comprise the largest portion of the military force (39.0%), followed by Ready Reserve members (30.5%) and DoD civilian personnel (24.2%).

Active Duty Member Highlights

Service Branches. The Army has the largest number of Active Duty members (528,070) followed by the Air Force (326,573), the Navy (319,838), and the Marine Corps (195,848). At a total of 1,370,329 DoD Active Duty members, the military force of 2013 is 9.0 percent smaller than it was in 1995 (when there were 1,505,283 Active Duty members). The percentage change in the number of Active Duty members varies by Service branch. Compared to 1995, the Marine Corps has increased 12.2 percent and the Army has increased 4.6 percent. Conversely, the number of Active Duty members is lower in 2013 compared to 1995 for the Navy (-25.6%) and Air Force (-17.6%).

Ratio of Ranks. The DoD Active Duty force has one officer for every 4.7 enlisted personnel. In comparison, the Air Force has one officer for every 4.0 enlisted personnel, the Army has one officer for every 4.3 enlisted personnel, the Navy has one officer for every 4.9 enlisted personnel, and the Marine Corps has one officer for every 8.2 enlisted personnel.

Gender. Women, who number 203,895, comprise 14.9 percent of the DoD Active Duty force, while 1,166,434 men comprise 85.1 percent of the DoD Active Duty force. Compared to 2000, the percentage of Active Duty officers who are women has increased (from 14.4% in 2000 to 16.4% in 2013), while the percentage of Active Duty enlisted members who are women has decreased (from 14.7% in 2000 to 14.5% in 2013). Overall, the number and ratio of female officers (39,286) to female enlisted members (164,609) is one female officer for every 4.2 female enlisted members, while the number and ratio of male officers (199,587) to male enlisted members (966,856) is one male officer for every 4.8 male enlisted members.

Race/Ethnicity. Less than one-third (30.7%) or 420,340 of Active Duty members identify themselves as a minority (i.e., Black or African American, Asian, American Indian or Alaska Native, Native Hawaiian or Other Pacific Islander, Multi-racial, or other/unknown). The percentage of Active Duty members who identify themselves as a minority is greater in 2013 than it was in 1995 (from 10.5% of officers and 28.2% of enlisted members in 1995, to 22.4% of

officers and 32.4% of enlisted members in 2013). The overall ratio of minority officers (53,487) to minority enlisted personnel (366,853) is one minority officer for every 6.9 minority enlisted personnel. To conform to the latest Office of Management and Budget (OMB) directives, Hispanic is not considered a minority race designation and is analyzed separately as an ethnicity. Overall, 11.6 percent of the DoD Active Duty force is of Hispanic ethnicity.

Geographic Location. While the Active Duty population is located throughout the world, the three primary areas in which Active Duty members are assigned are the United States and its territories (87.2%), East Asia (6.8%), and Europe (4.9%). The ten states with the highest Active Duty military populations are California (158,502), Virginia (125,477), Texas (122,479), North Carolina (104,942), Georgia (72,051), Washington (62,145), Florida (60,234), Hawaii (47,790), Kentucky (40,664), and Colorado (37,182). Active Duty members in these ten states comprise 69.9 percent of the personnel stationed in the United States.

Age. More than one-quarter (25.8%) of Active Duty officers are 41 years of age or older, with the next largest age group being 26 to 30 years (22.7%), followed by 31 to 35 years (20.4%), 36 to 40 yeas (18.0%), and those 25 years or younger (13.2%). Nearly one-half (49.4%) of Active Duty enlisted personnel are 25 years of age or younger, with the next largest age group being 26 to 30 years (22.5%), followed by 31 to 35 years (13.7%), 36 to 40 years (8.8%) and those 41 years or older (5.5%). Overall, the average age of the Active Duty force is 28.6 years. The average age for Active Duty officers is 34.8 years, and the average age for Active Duty enlisted personnel is 27.3 years.

Education Level. The majority (83.2%) of officers have a Bachelor's or higher degree. Few enlisted members (6.5%) have a Bachelor's degree or higher, while most (92.5%) have a high school diploma and/or some college experience but less than a Bachelor's degree. Compared to 1995, the percentage of total Active Duty members who have a Bachelor's and/or an advanced degree has decreased for officers (from 89.6% in 1995 to 83.2% in 2013), but has increased for enlisted personnel (from 3.4% in 1995 to 6.5% in 2013).

Marital Status. Just over half (55.2%) of Active Duty military members are married, which is lower than the percentage that were married in 1995 (59.9%). In 2013, a majority (69.7%) of officers and over half (52.2%) of enlisted personnel report themselves as married. Over half (57.1%) of Active Duty males and nearly half (44.5%) of Active Duty females are married. In addition, 6.4 percent of DoD's Active Duty members are in dual-military marriages. During the 2013 fiscal year, 1.9 percent of officers and 3.8 percent of enlisted personnel are estimated to have divorced.

Reserve and Guard (Selected Reserve) Member Highlights

Reserve Components. The data pertaining to Reserve and Guard members depict the Selected Reserve only, unless otherwise specified. The introduction to Section III (pg. 55) describes the composition of the Reserve forces of the United States, and explains why most data displays are limited to Selected Reserve personnel. The Selected Reserve Force consists of 842,510 members in seven components. The Army National Guard (357,735) and Army Reserve (198,209) have the largest number of Selected Reserve members, followed by the Air National Guard (105,708), the Air Force Reserve (70,913), the Navy Reserve (62,444), the Marine Corps Reserve (39,501) and the DHS's Coast Guard Reserve (8,000). Similar to the Active Duty force, the overall number of members in the Selected Reserve is lower in 2013

compared to 1995. The Selected Reserve force is 11.6 percent smaller than it was in 1995 (when there were 953,192 Selected Reserve members).

Ratio of Ranks. The Selected Reserve is composed of 15.3 percent officers (128,831) and 84.7 percent enlisted personnel (713,679). Overall, there is one officer for every 5.5 enlisted personnel. This ratio varies across the Selected Reserve, with the Navy Reserve having one officer for every 3.4 enlisted personnel, the Air Force Reserve having one officer for every 4.0 enlisted personnel, the Army Reserve having one officer for every 4.6 enlisted personnel, the Coast Guard Reserve having one officer for every 5.1 enlisted personnel, the Air National Guard having one officer for every 6.2 enlisted personnel, the Army National Guard having one officer for every 6.9 enlisted personnel, and the Marine Corps Reserve having one officer for every 8.6 enlisted personnel.

Gender. Women, who number 155,589, comprise 18.5 percent of the Selected Reserve force, while 686,918 men comprise 81.5 percent of the Selected Reserve force. The percentage of women in the Selected Reserve has increased since 2000 (from 17.5% of officers and 16.4% of enlisted members in 2000, to 18.7% of officers and 18.4% of enlisted members in 2013). Overall, the ratio of female officers (24,142) to female enlisted members (131,447) is one female officer for every 5.4 female enlisted members, while the ratio of male officers (104,688) to male enlisted members (582,230) is one male officer for every 5.6 male enlisted members.

Race/Ethnicity. Approximately one-quarter (25.1% or 211,161) of the Selected Reserve members identify themselves as a minority (i.e., Black or African American, Asian, American Indian or Alaska Native, Native Hawaiian or Other Pacific Islander, Multi-racial, or other/unknown). The Selected Reserve is composed of 25,769 minority officers and 185,392 minority enlisted personnel, with one minority officer for every 7.2 minority enlisted personnel. The overall minority representation of officers in the Selected Reserve has increased from 14.6 percent in 1995 to 20.0 percent in 2013, while the minority representation of enlisted personnel in the Selected Reserve has decreased from 29.5 percent in 1995 to 26.0 percent in 2013. To conform to the latest Office of Management and Budget (OMB) directives, Hispanic is not considered a minority race designation and is analyzed separately as an ethnicity. Overall, 10.4 percent of the Selected Reserve is of Hispanic ethnicity.

Geographic Location. The majority (834,332 or 99.0%) of the Selected Reserve is located throughout the United States and its territories. The ten states with the highest Selected Reserve population are California (59,705), Texas (53,561), Florida (36,745), Pennsylvania (32,034), New York (30,577), Ohio (28,322), Georgia (27,513), Virginia (26,320), Illinois (24,696), and North Carolina (23,390). These ten states comprise 42.0 percent of the total Selected Reserve population in the United States.

Age. Slightly less than half (47.0%) of Selected Reserve officers are 41 years of age or older, with the next largest age group being 31 to 35 years (17.4%), followed by 36 to 40 years (17.3%), 26 to 30 years (12.7%), and those 25 years or younger (5.6%). More than one-third (39.4%) of Selected Reserve enlisted members are 25 years of age or younger, with the next largest age group being 26 to 30 years (20.0%), followed by 41 years or older (17.9%), 31 to 35 years (13.7%), and those 36 to 40 years (9.0%). Overall, the average age of the Selected Reserve is 31.8 years. The average age for Selected Reserve officers is 39.4 years, and the average age for Selected Reserve enlisted personnel is 30.5 years.

Education Level. The majority (86.0%) of Selected Reserve officers have a Bachelor's degree or higher. Most enlisted members (84.0%) have a high school diploma and/or some college experience, and 9.5 percent of enlisted members have a Bachelor's degree or higher. Since

1995, the percentage of Selected Reserve members who have a Bachelor's and/or advanced degree has increased for both officers (from 79.9% in 1995 to 86.0% in 2013) and enlisted personnel (from 7.3% in 1995 to 9.5% in 2013).

Marital Status. Just under half (45.9%) of Selected Reserve members are married, compared to 55.5 percent who were married in 1995. In 2013, 69.3 percent of Selected Reserve officers and 41.7 percent of Selected Reserve enlisted personnel report themselves as married. About one-half (48.3%) of Selected Reserve males and one-third (35.6%) of Selected Reserve females are married. In addition, 2.6 percent of the Selected Reserve report that they are in a dual-military marriage. During the 2013 fiscal year, 1.8 percent of Selected Reserve officers and 2.8 percent of Selected Reserve enlisted personnel are estimated to have divorced.

Overview of Military Families

Across the DoD Active Duty and Selected Reserve population, there are 2,204,839 military personnel and 2,978,341 family members, including spouses, children, and adult dependents. Of the military personnel, 41.7 percent are single with no children, 36.1 percent are married with children, 15.6 percent are married without children, and 6.6 percent are single with children. Overall, 42.7 percent of DoD military personnel have children in 2013, compared to 39.9 percent in 2000. Of the 1,888,486 total military children in 2013, the largest percentage are between birth and 5 years of age (37.4%), followed by 6 to 11 years of age (30.8%), and 12 to 18 years of age (24.7%). Fewer children are between 19 and 22 years of age (7.1%); however, children ages 21 to 22 must be enrolled as full-time students in order to qualify as dependents. More than half (51.7%) of DoD military personnel are married. Of the 1,076,564 DoD spouses, nearly one-quarter (23.5%) of spouses are 26 to 30 years of age, while 21.9 percent are 25 years of age or younger, 20.4 percent are 41 years of age or older, 19.8 percent are 31 to 35 years of age, and 14.4 percent are 36 to 40 years of age.

Active Duty Family Highlights

There are fewer DoD Active Duty members (1,370,329) than their associated family members (1,878,092). More than one-third of the members (37.8%) of the Active Duty force are married with children and 5.0 percent are single parents. The largest group of children is between birth through 5 years old (495,156). The next largest groups are between the ages of 6 and 11 years old (368,661), between 12 and 18 years old (262,550), and between 19 and 22 years old (51,605). There are 10,776 adult dependents ages 23 and older among the families of Active Duty members.

Reserve and Guard (Selected Reserve) Family Highlights

There are fewer DoD and DHS Selected Reserve members (842,510) than their associated family members (1,110,803). Of the 842,510 Selected Reserve members, 33.2 percent are married with children and 9.3 percent are single parents. The largest group of children is between the ages of 6 and 11 years (215,056), followed by children between birth and 5 years (213,781), between 12 and 18 years (204,589), and between the ages of 19 and 22 years (83,453). In addition, there are 1,848 adult dependents 23 years and older claimed as dependents by Selected Reserve members.

It serves as a reference tool for professionals who develop policy or deliver programs and services to military members and families in the Armed Forces. The 2013 Report

To provide a holistic profile of the military community, the 2013 Report presents demographic information for Active Duty and Reserve and Guard personnel. In addition, selected Census data are presented as a point of reference, and military demographics trends for 1995, 2000, 2005, 2010, 2011, 2012, and 2013 are included where possible.

The data contained in this publication were derived from a variety of sources and, in general, only data that are available on a consistent basis for all Services are presented. The majority of data are managed by the Defense Manpower Data Center, particularly the Active Duty Military Personnel Master File, the Active Duty Military Family File, the Reserve Components Common Personnel Data System, and the Reserve Components Family File.

All exhibits included in this report contain source citations, and the Data Sources and References section of this document provides a reference for all data sources. Readers needing additional information are encouraged to directly access the listed sources.

Guidelines for Interpreting Data

Guiding principles for interpreting data include:

- Numbers for population groups (e.g., Active Duty, enlisted members) may vary across exhibits as a result of different data sources, missing data, and/or rounding.
- Percentages may not total to 100 due to rounding or missing data.
- Warrant officers are included with officers unless otherwise noted.

In the Active Duty sections of this report, data are presented for the four DoD Service branches (Army, Navy, Marine Corps, and Air Force). Some information about the DHS's Active Duty

Coast Guard is presented in the Total Military Force section of this report. In the Reserve and Guard Members section, the label "Total DoD" is used to reflect the six Reserve components under DoD (Army National Guard, Army Reserve, Navy Reserve, Marine Corps Reserve, Air National Guard, and Air Force Reserve), while "Total Selected Reserve" includes DHS's Coast Guard Reserve data in addition to data from the DoD Reserve components.

The data pertaining to Reserve and Guard members depict the Selected Reserve and the National Guard and do not include any other Ready Reserve forces (i.e., Individual Ready Reserve and Inactive National Guard) unless otherwise specified. The introduction to Section III describes the composition of the Reserve forces of the United States and explains why most data displays are limited to Selected Reserve personnel.

All data pertaining to Active Duty and Selected Reserve family members (i.e., spouses, children, and adult dependents) are extracted from the Defense Enrollment and Eligibility Reporting System (DEERS). Therefore, the data are dependent on the military members reporting the necessary information.

This section contains numeric data for the total military population, including Active Duty, Reserve and Guard forces, and DoD civilians.


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TOTAL MILITARY FORCE

1.01. Military Personnel (N=3,616,568)

This pie graph presents the total number of Active Duty and Reserve and Guard members from all branches of the DoD and the DHS Coast Guard, as well as the civilian personnel who support the DoD. Overall, the total military force comprises 3,616,568 people. DoD's Active Duty members make up 37.9 percent of the total military force. Data for all DoD Active Duty members are presented in Section II.

All Reserve and Guard manpower is assigned to one of three Reserve Component categories: the Ready Reserve, the Standby Reserve, or the Retired Reserve. The Ready Reserve makes up 30.5 percent of the total military force. The Ready Reserve comprises the Selected Reserve, the Individual Ready Reserve, and the Inactive National Guard. Because Selected Reserve members train throughout the year and participate annually in Active Duty training exercises, they are the primary focus of the Reserve sections of this report. DHS's Coast Guard Reserve members are frequently called for duty; therefore, their data are included as well. Data for all Selected Reserve members are presented in Section III.



1.02. Active Duty and Ready Reserve Personnel (N=2,513,168)

This pie graph presents the distribution of Active Duty and Ready Reserve personnel by Service branch and Reserve component, respectively. Active Duty and Reserve and Guard members of the Army make up the largest percentage of military personnel (47.4%), followed by Active Duty and Reserve and Guard members of the Air Force (21.4%), the Navy (17.1%), the Marine Corps (12.1%), and the Coast Guard (2.0%).


Official Guard and Reserve Manpower Strengths & Statistics FY 2013 Summary

DoD CIVILIAN PERSONNEL

DoD civilians are divided into two primary categories. Appropriated Funds (APF) civilian employees are funded by congressional appropriations. Non-Appropriated Funds (NAF) civilian employees are not funded by congressional appropriations, but are funded by revenue-generating activities.

1.03. DoD Appropriated Funds (APF) Civilians (N=745,229)

This pie graph presents the distribution of APF civilian personnel. There are 745,229 APF civilian personnel who constitute 20.6 percent of the total DoD workforce. Of the 745,229 DoD APF civilians, the largest percentage are employed by the Army (36.0%), followed by the Navy (23.6%), Air Force (23.0%), and Other DoD (14.8%). The Marine Corps (2.7%) employs the smallest percentage of APF civilians.



1.04. DoD Non-Appropriated Funds (NAF) Civilians (N=128,825)

This pie graph presents the distribution of NAF civilian personnel. There are 128,825 NAF civilians who constitute 3.6 percent of the total DoD workforce. The largest percentage are working for the Army & Air Force Exchange Service (AAFES; 25.0%), followed by the Navy (24.1%), Army (21.7%), Air Force (18.0%), and Marine Corps (10.6%). The remainder (0.6%) work within other areas of DoD.



1.05. Officers and Enlisted Members in the Total Military Force (N=2,204,839)

This pie graph presents the total number of Active Duty and Selected Reserve officers and enlisted members across the DoD. Overall, the total DoD force is composed of 366,390 (16.6%) officers and 1,838,449 (83.4%) enlisted members.



1.06. Gender of the Total Military Force (N=2,204,836)

This pie graph presents the distribution of Active Duty and Selected Reserve members by gender. Overall, the total DoD force has 358,156 (16.2%) female members and 1,846,680 (83.8%) male members.





1.07. Race of the Total Military Force (N=2,204,839)

This pie graph presents the race of Active Duty and Selected Reserve members across the DoD. Members who report themselves as White represent the largest proportion of the total DoD force (71.5%), while Black or African American members represent 16.5 percent. Asian, American Indian or Alaska Native, and Native Hawaiian or Other Pacific Islander members make up 3.6 percent, 1.2 percent, and 0.9 percent, respectively. Over two percent (2.3%) of members report themselves as Multi-racial.







1.09. Marital Status of the Total Military Force (N=2,204,839)

This pie graph presents the marital status of the total DoD military force. Overall, 51.7 percent of DoD military members are reported as married. In comparison, 51.6 percent of the U.S. population 18 years old and over was married in 2013 according to United States Census numbers. For both groups, "married" includes those who are married or remarried.





1.10. Gender of the Total Military Force Trends: 2000-2013

SECTION II: ACTIVE DUTY MEMBERS


This section focuses on the total Active Duty population. Special areas of interest include information on gender, race/ethnicity, geographic location, age, education level, marital status, and retirements and separations from Active Duty.







































































All Reserve and Guard manpower is assigned to one of three Reserve component categories: the Ready Reserve, the Standby Reserve, and the Retired Reserve. The first few exhibits in this section present information on Ready Reserve personnel. The Ready Reserve comprises the Selected Reserve, the Individual Ready Reserve, and the Inactive National Guard. Because Selected Reserve members train throughout the year and participate annually in Active Duty training exercises, the rest of the exhibits in this section are focused on the Selected Reserve. The specific characteristics of the Selected Reserve components addressed in this section include gender, race/ethnicity, geographic location, age, education level, marital status, and retirements and losses.

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READY RESERVE PERSONNEL

3.01. Ready Reserve Officers and Enlisted Members (N=1,102,419)

The distribution of officers and enlisted personnel of the Ready Reserve is depicted in this pie graph. The Ready Reserve is a major source of manpower and includes the Selected Reserve, the Individual Ready Reserve (IRR), and the Inactive National Guard (ING). IRR and ING members typically have served as Active Duty or Selected Reserve members in the past, but do not currently participate in organized training. Selected Reserve members train throughout the year and participate annually in Active Duty training exercises. Across all components of the Ready Reserve, there are 158,520 total officers and 943,899 total enlisted members.







This exhibit shows the trends of Selected Reserve officer to enlisted member ratios from 2000 through 2013. Individual branches have seen larger changes in their respective ratios of officers to enlisted members than the changes in ratio for the total Selected Reserve. The Air National Guard, for example, went from 1 officer per 3.3 enlisted members in 2000 to 1 officer for every 6.2 enlisted members in 2013. Conversely, the greatest increase in the ratio of officers to enlisted members from 2000 to 2013 was in the Air Force Reserve, but the ratio has been gradually decreasing since 2005.




















































































































