Background & Demographics

• Survey Methods

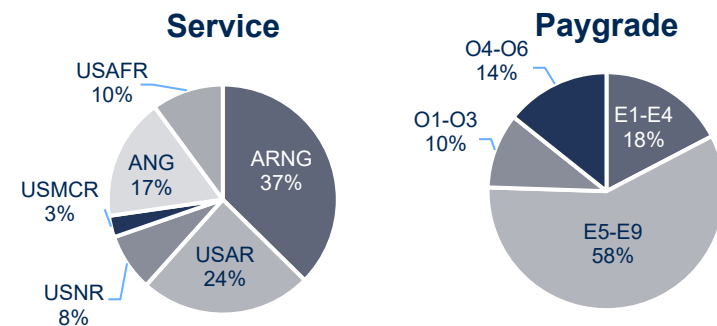
- The Reserve Component Spouse Survey (RCSS) is fielded every two years using scientific survey methods including stratified random sampling and weighting
- 2019 survey was designed to allow comparisons to previous administrations
- Results are generalizable to the population of Reserve component spouses—only survey of its kind in DoD

• Sample and Response

- 50,815 sample size , 15% weighted response rate
- Field period from January to June 2019
- Target population: Reserve Component member spouses from the Army National Guard (ARNG), U.S. Army Reserve (USAR), U.S. Navy Reserve (USNR), U.S. Marine Corps Reserve (USMCR), Air National Guard (ANG), and U.S. Air Force Reserve (USAFR)

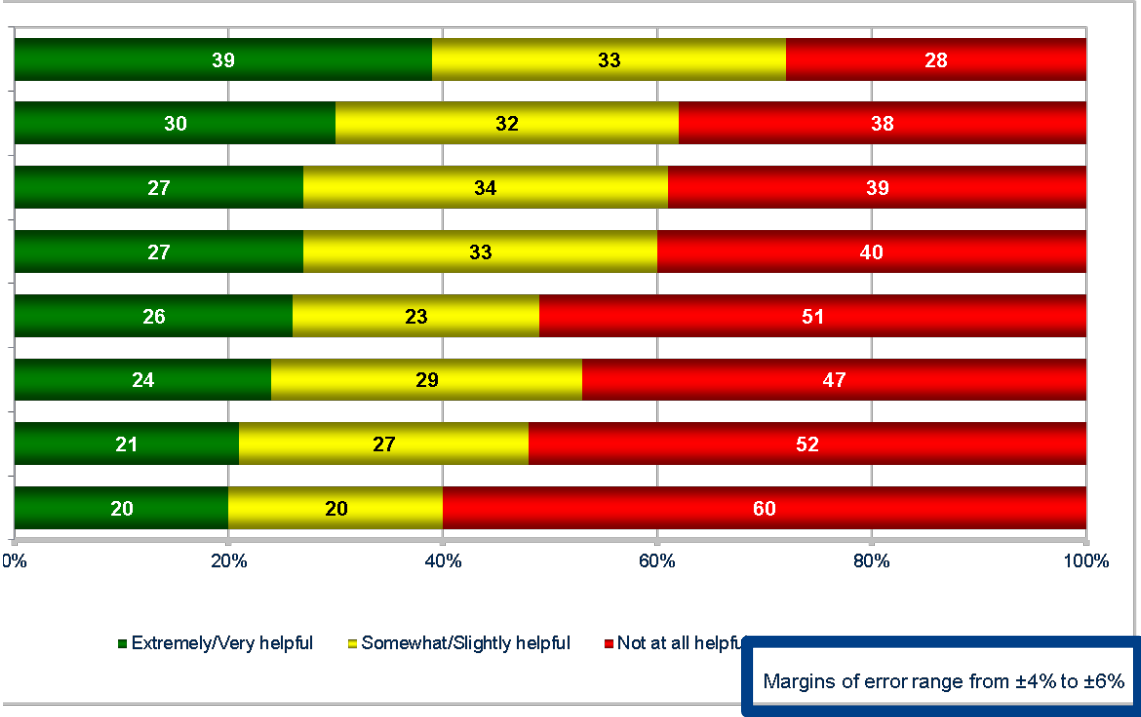
• Key Demographics (weighted)

- 75% With child(ren) under age 18
- 85% Female
- 27% Minority
- 43% No college/Some college, 34% 4-Year degree, 23% Graduate/Professional degree
- 36% Lived less 30 minutes from installation/base, 29% lived 30 minutes to 1 hour from installation/base, and 35% lived 1 hour or more from installation/base

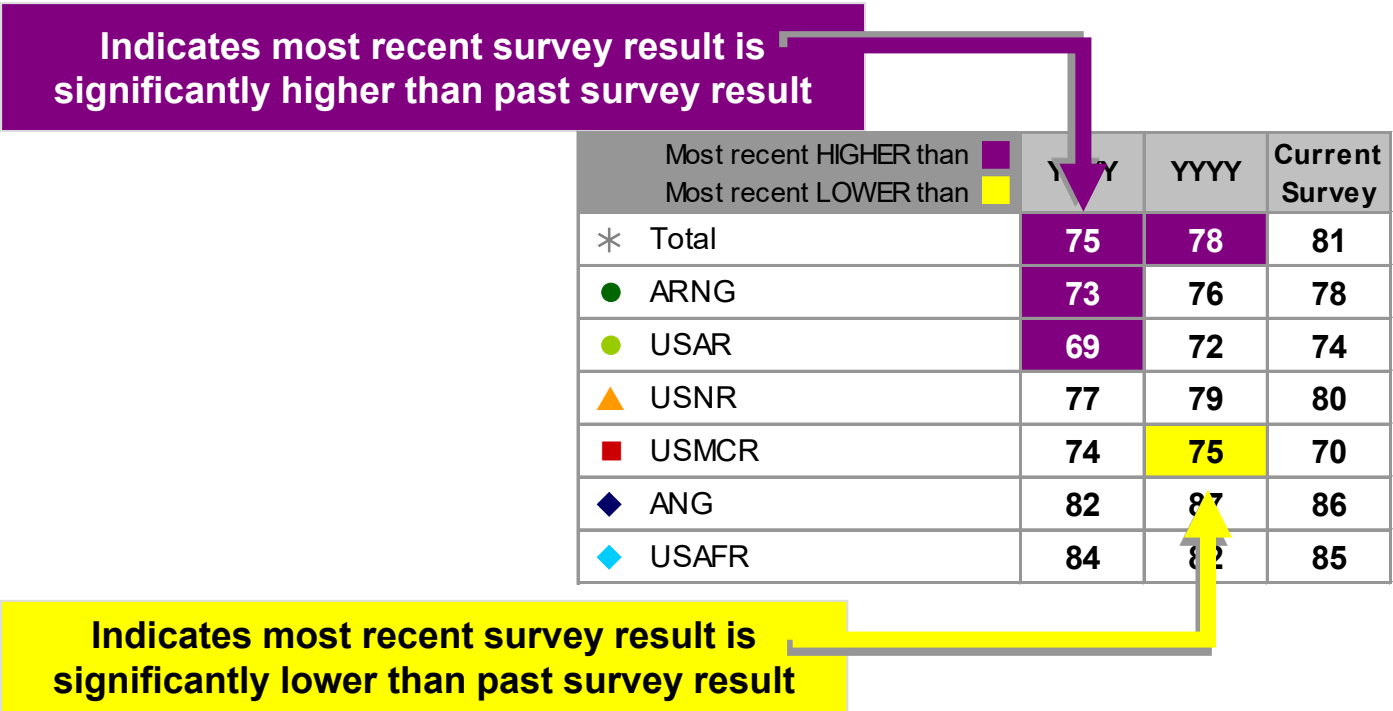
- Graphic displays of overall results

 - Yellow cells indicate current survey result is LOWER



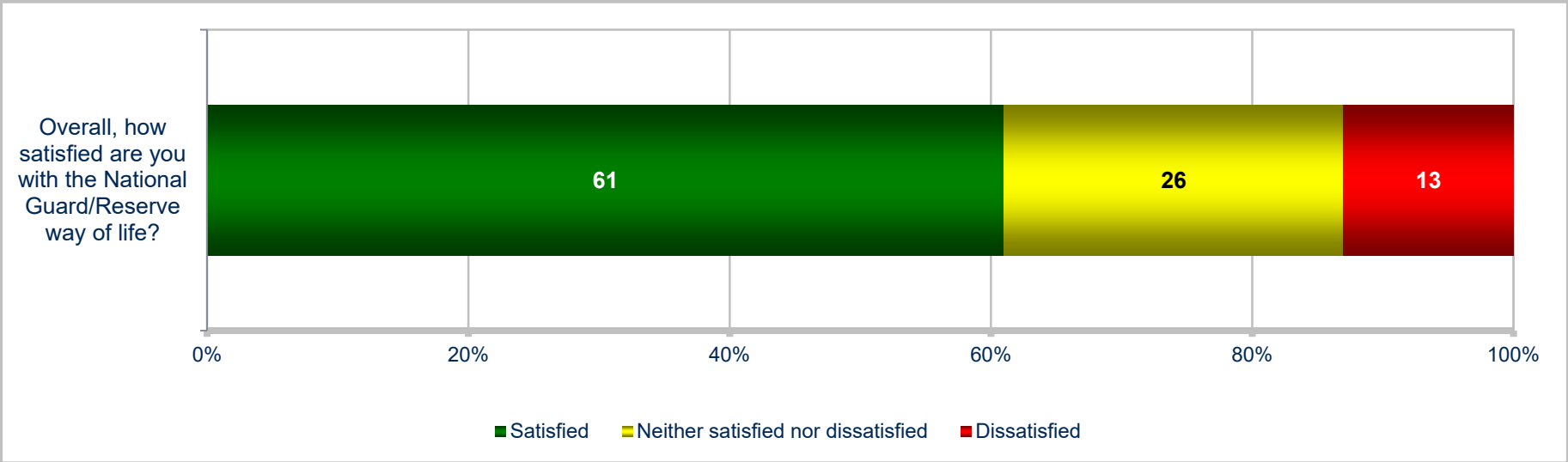
Spouse Military Support

Trends: Spouse Military Support

- **More than half satisfied with the National Guard/Reserve lifestyle:** 61% of spouses were satisfied with military way of life, steady since 2009.
- **Six in ten spouses favor staying:** 66% favored their husband/wife staying in the National Guard/Reserve.
- **Majority report support to stay remains unchanged:** 59% of spouses reported their support for their husband/wife's decision to stay in the National Guard/Reserve had not changed over the last year

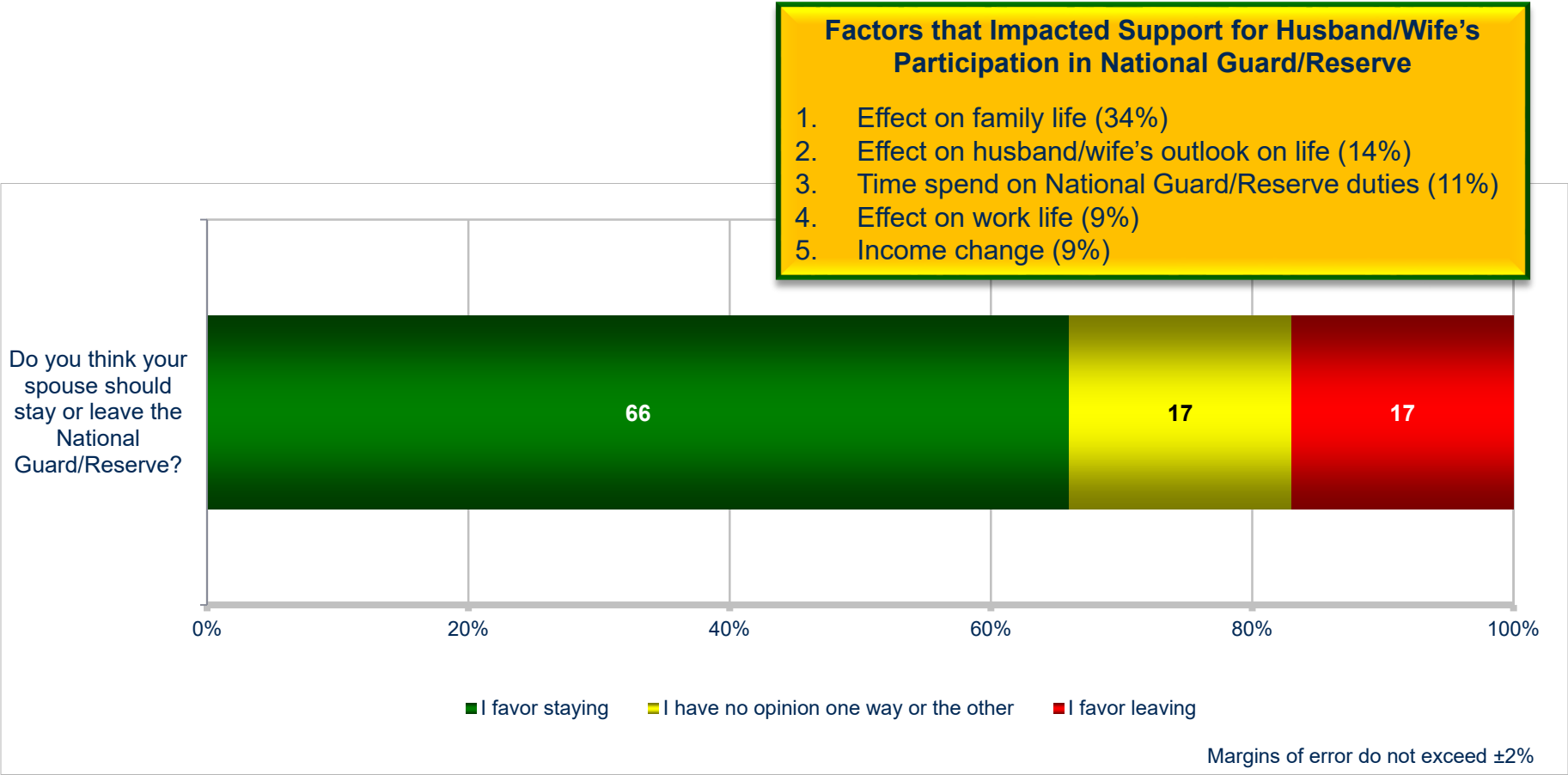

Support To Stay in the National Guard/Reserve

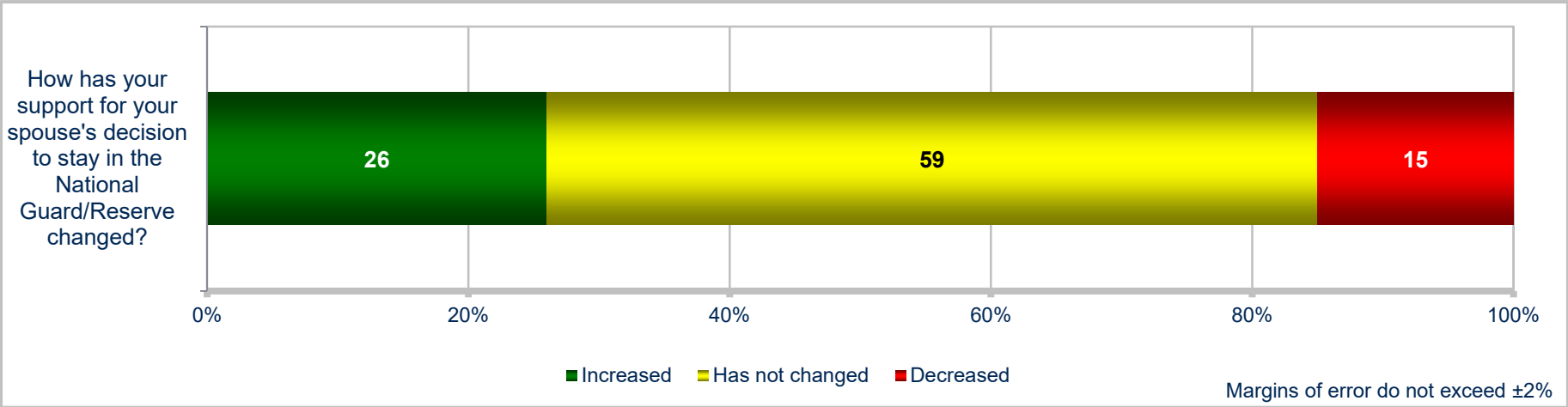
Percent of All Reserve Spouses

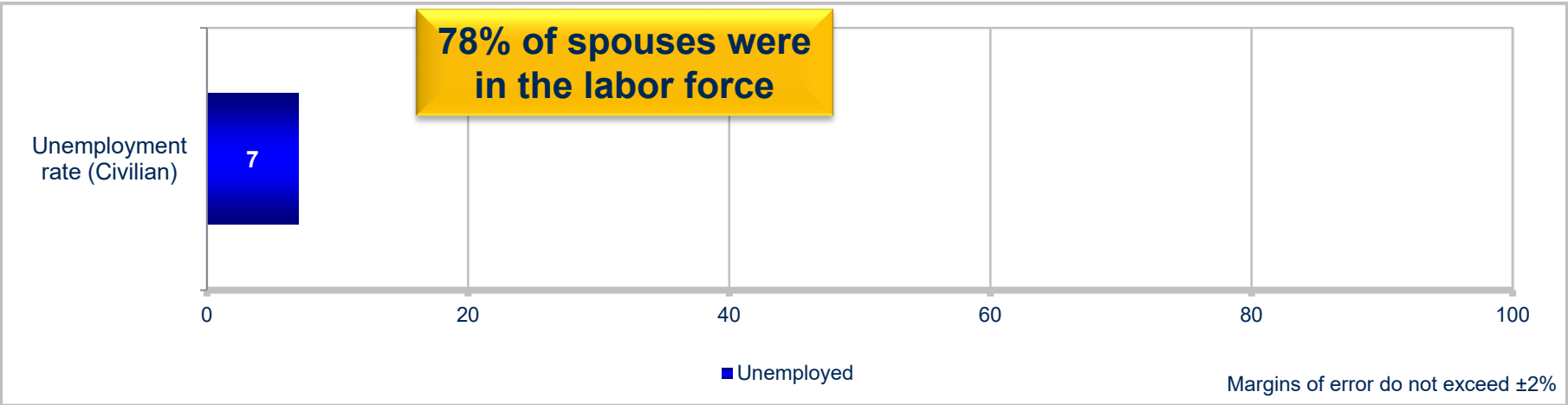
Spouse Employment and Financial Condition

Trends: Employment and Financial Condition

- **Spouse unemployment rate was 7% in 2019** (statistically the same as in 2017 and 2014)
- **A majority of spouses experienced financial comfort in 2019:** 68% of spouses reported a comfortable financial condition in 2019, higher than in 2014, 2012, and 2009 and the same as in 2017

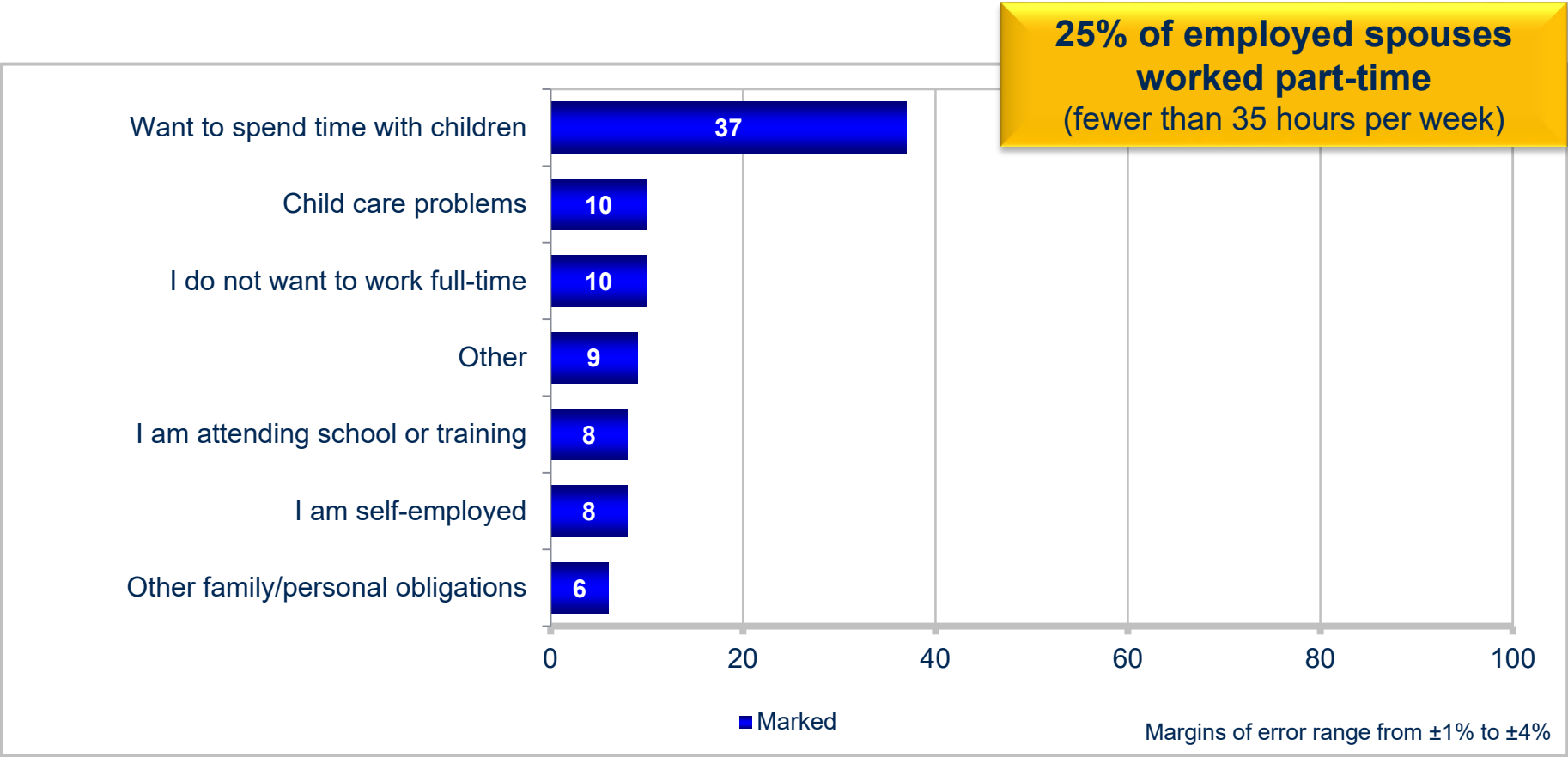

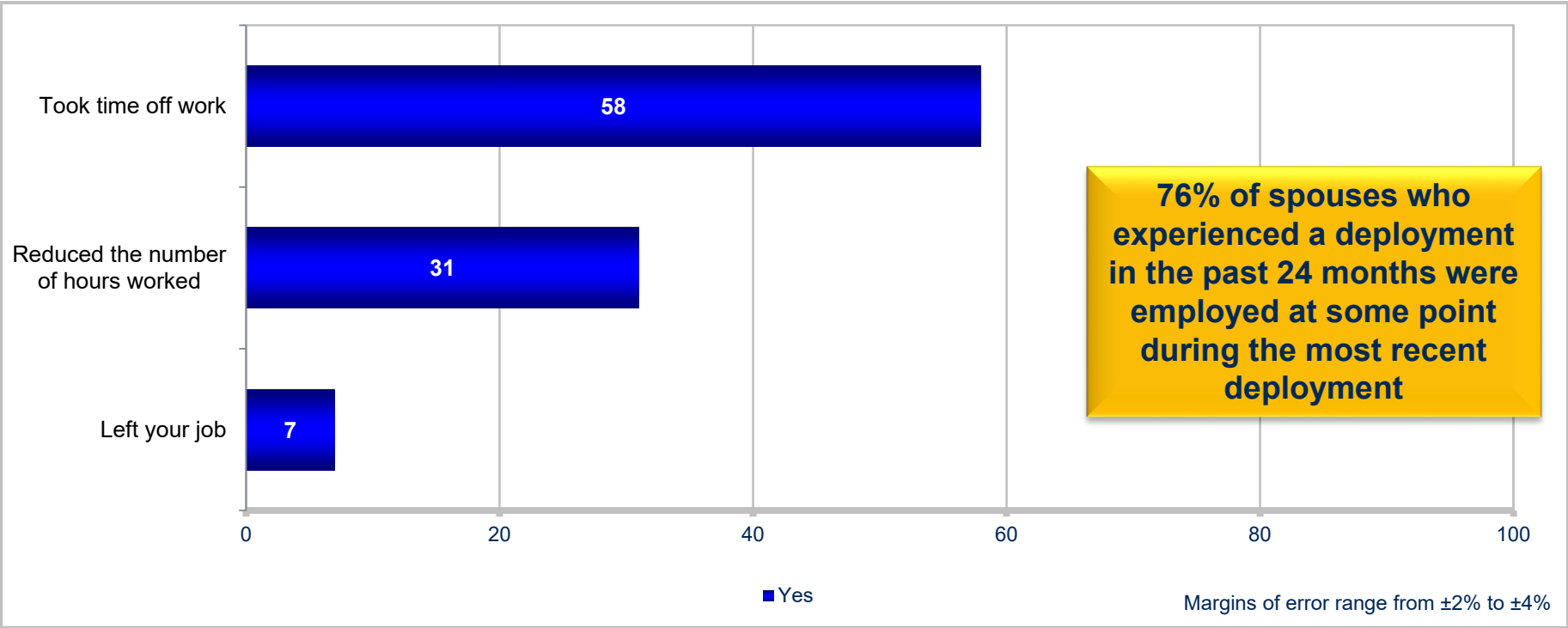
Main Reason for Working Part-Time

Percent of Reserve Spouses Who Held a Job During Their Husband/Wife's Most Recent Deployment



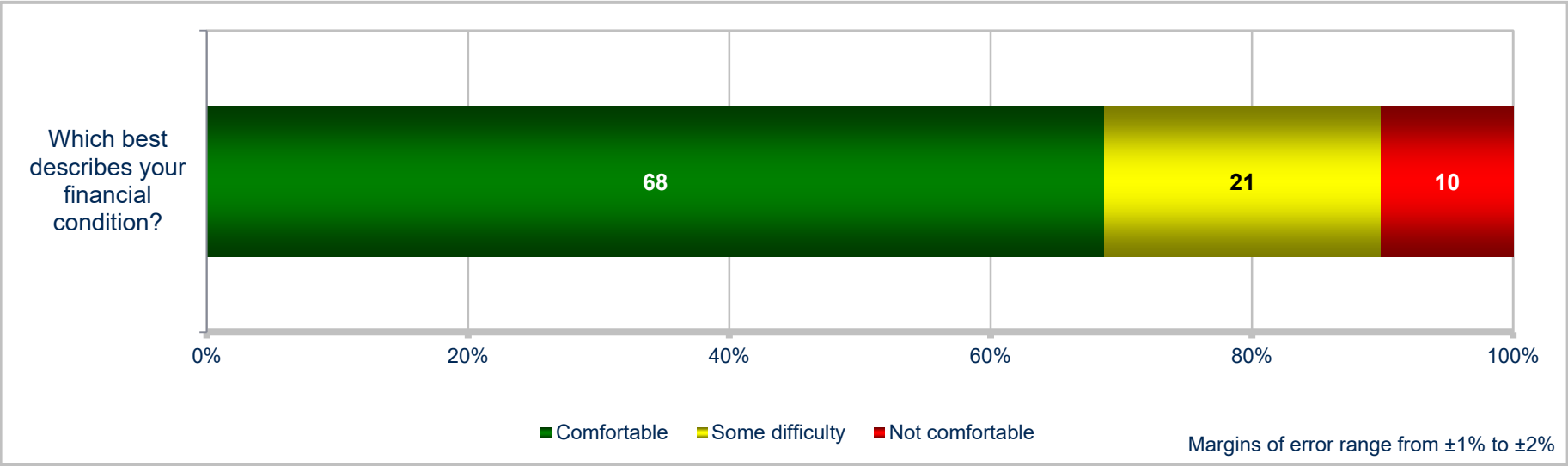

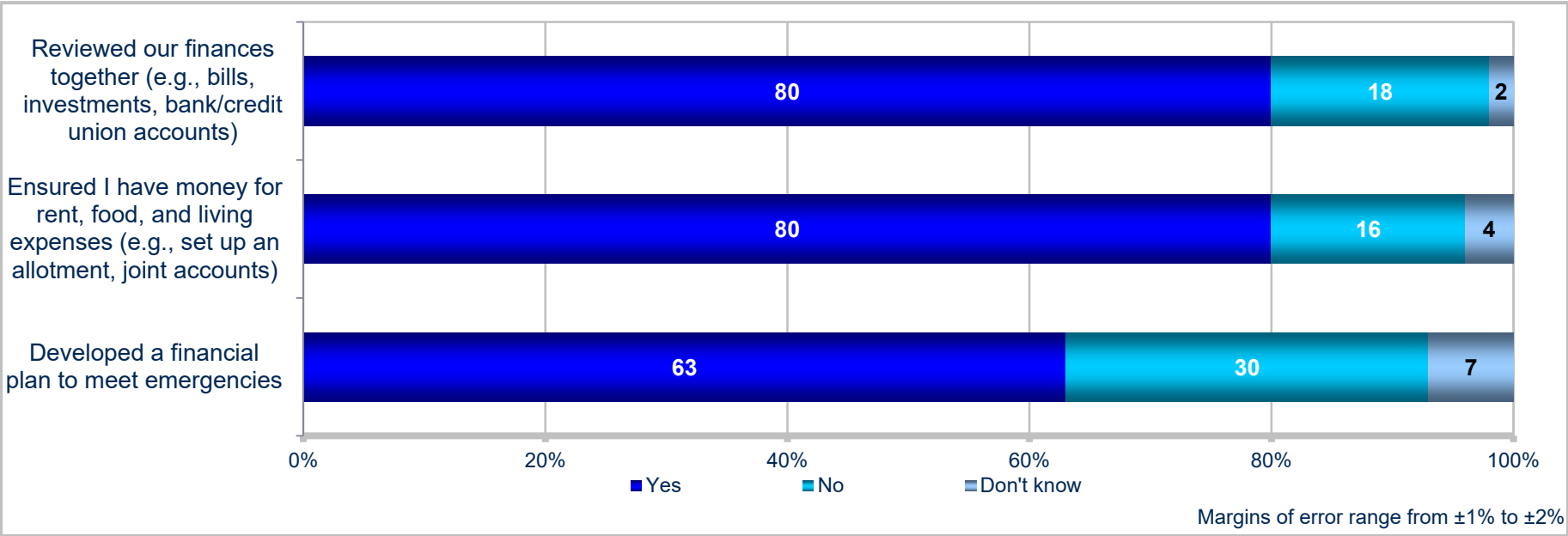

Percent of All Reserve Spouses



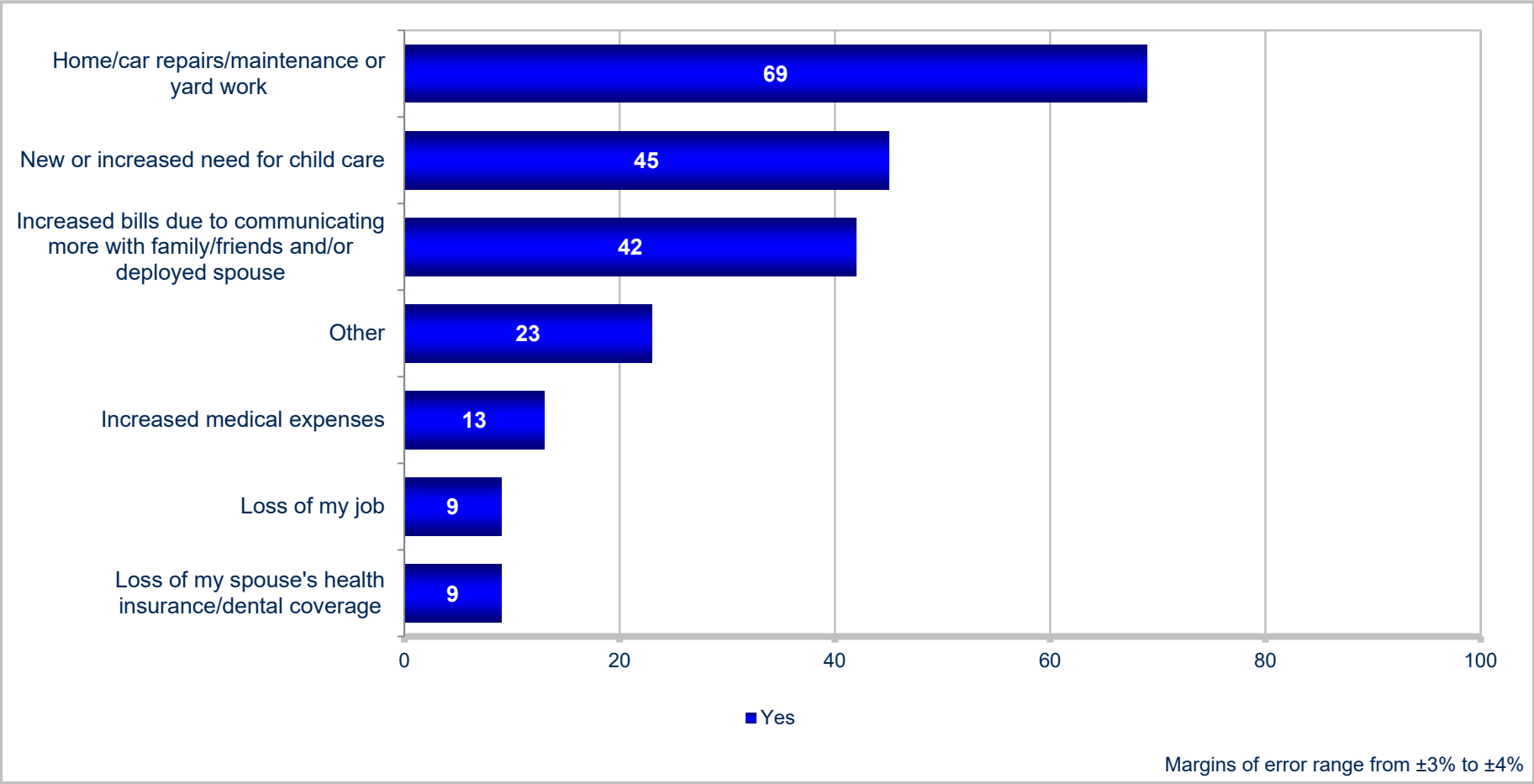
- Higher response of Yes:

- **Higher response of *Increased bills due to communicating more with family/friends and/or deployed spouse* – USMCR (58%)**

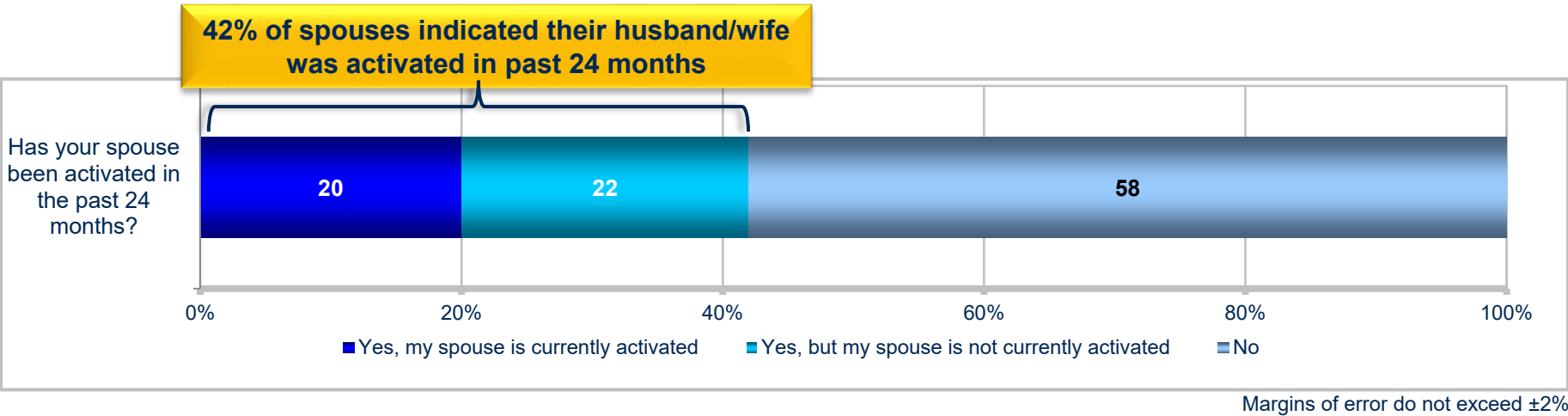
Activation/Deployment

Trends: Activation and Deployment

- **Four in 10 spouses reported their husband/wife had been activated** in the past 24 months
- **Tricare medical coverage was the most frequently used military-provided program/service:** 78% of spouses whose husband/wife had been deployed in past 24 months reported using Tricare medical coverage in 2019
- A majority (63%) of spouses who interacted with **a Unit or Service Point of Contact (POC)** during their husband/wife's deployment were satisfied with the assistance they received
- **Increased stress was an issue for half of spouses** during their husband/wife deployed

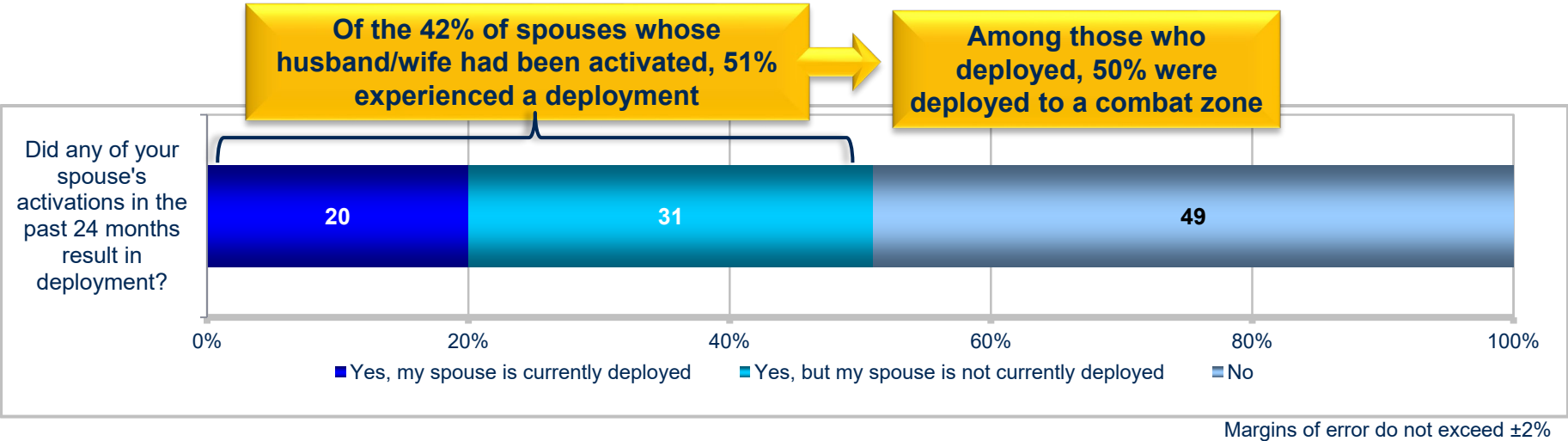
Activated in Past 24 Months

Percent of All Reserve Spouses



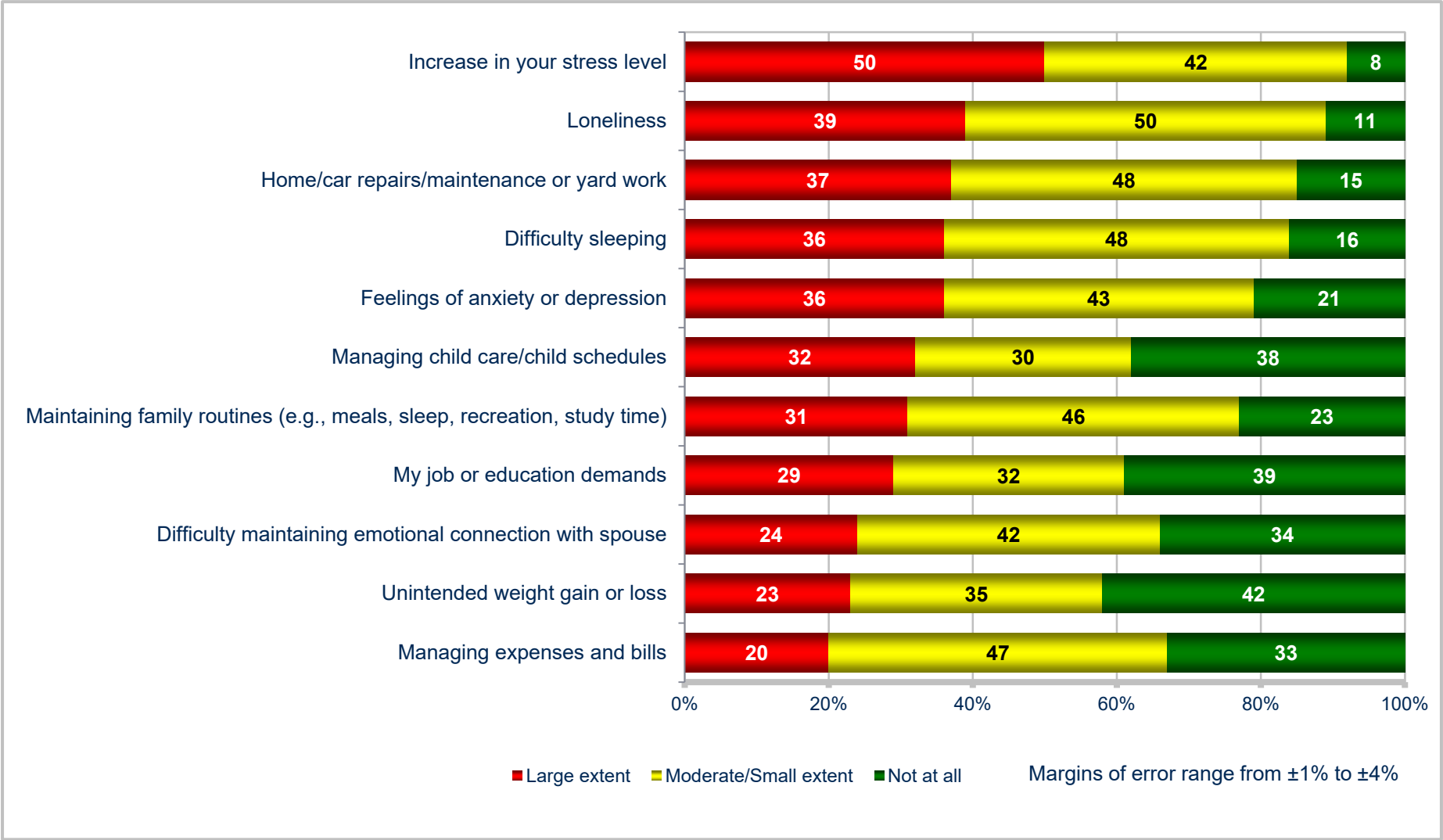
Deployed in Past 24 Months

Percent of Reserve Spouses Whose Husband/Wife Had Been Activated in Past 24 Months



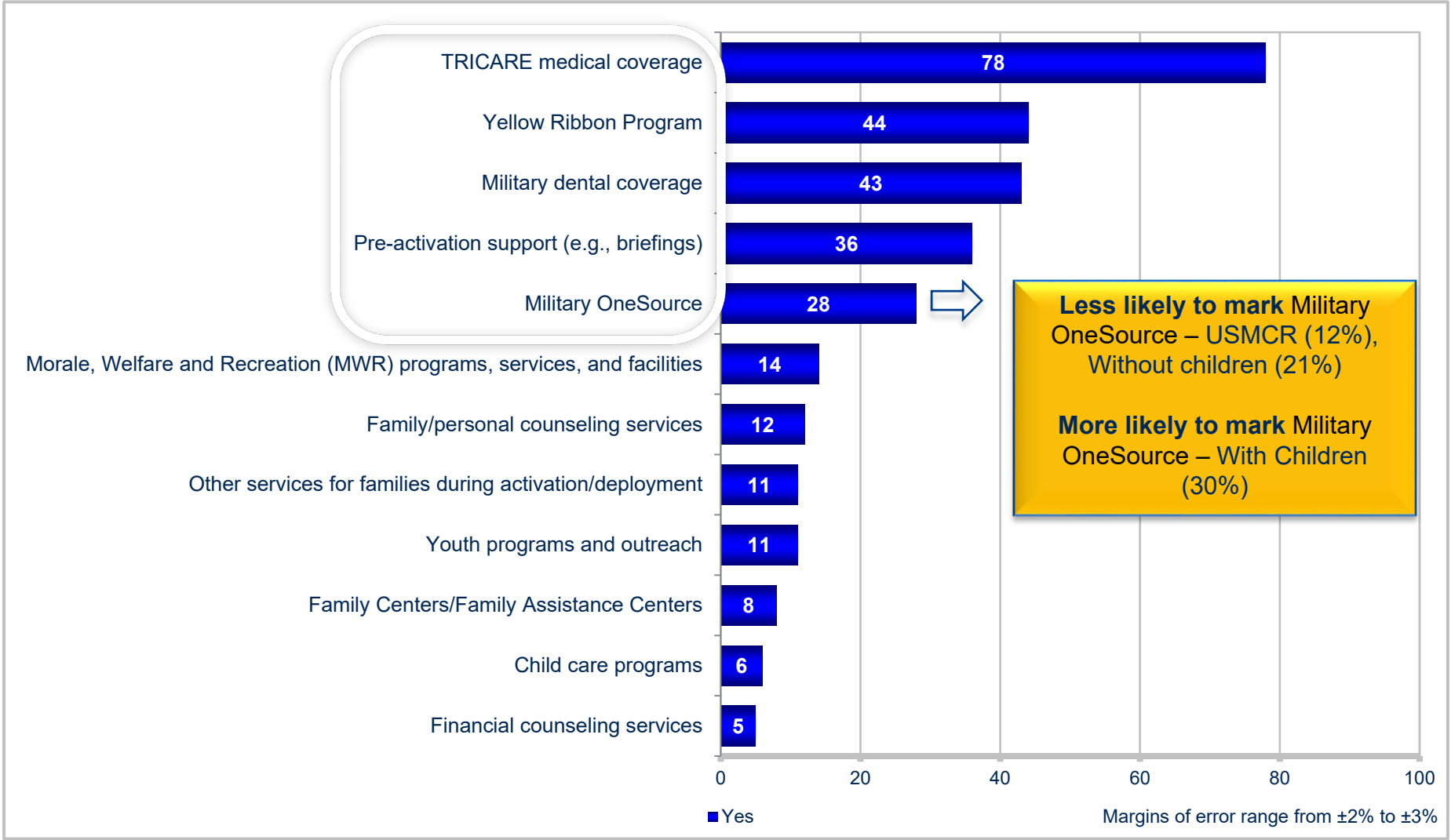
Extent of Problems During Deployment

Percent of Reserve Spouses Whose Husband/Wife Had Been Deployed in Past 24 Months



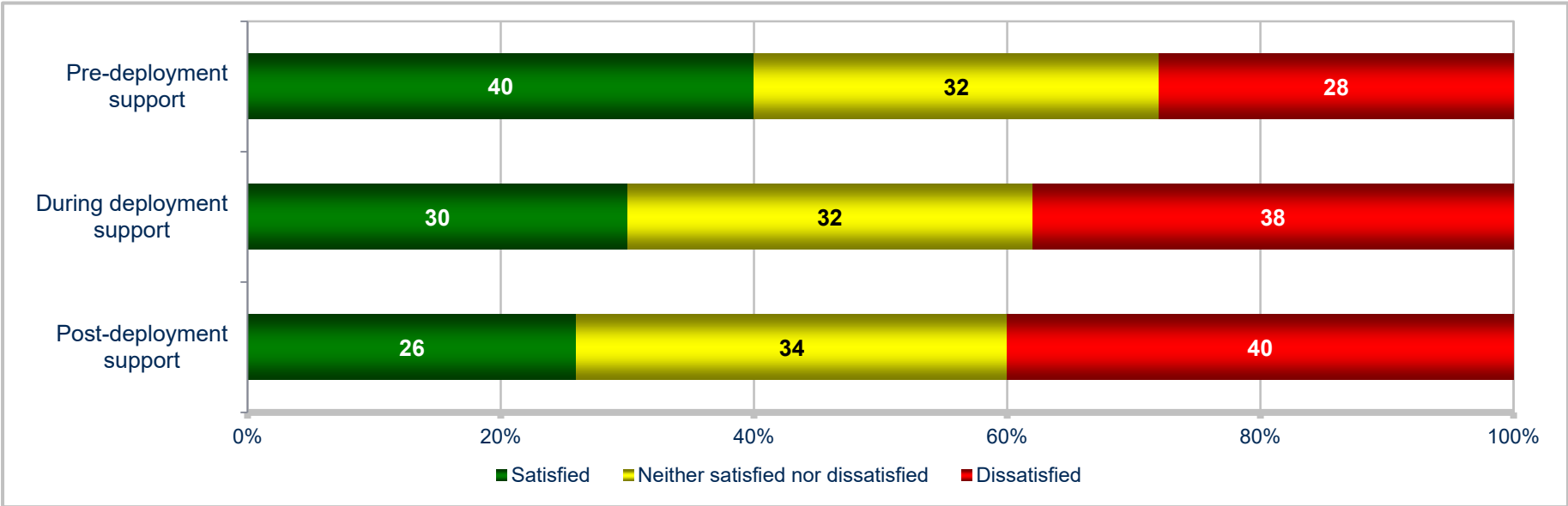
Use of Military-Provided Programs/Services

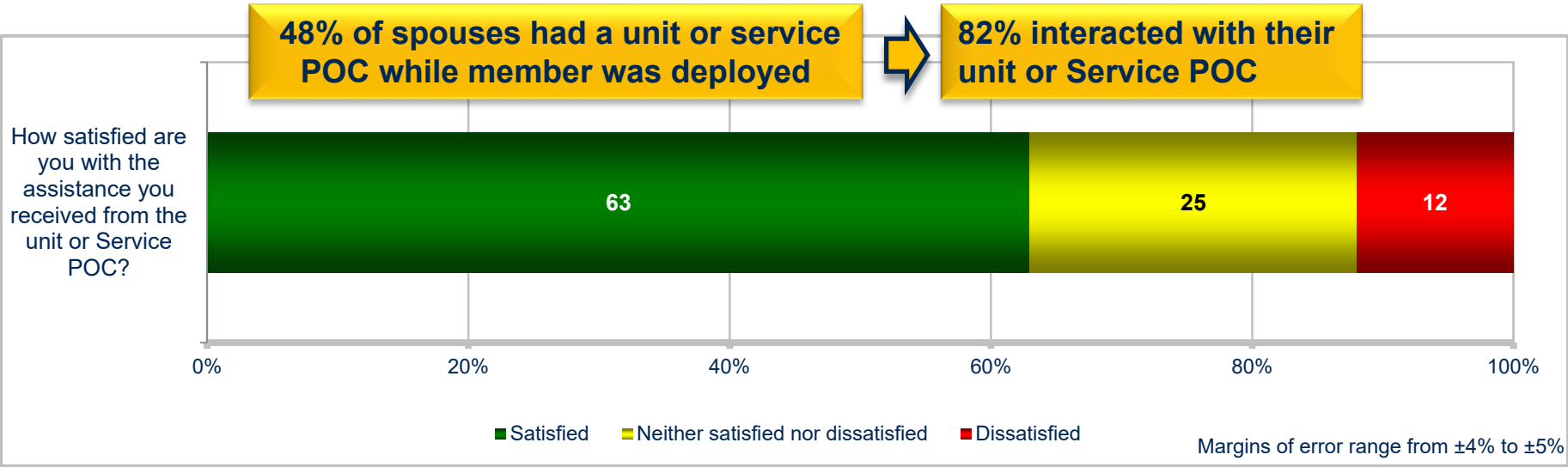

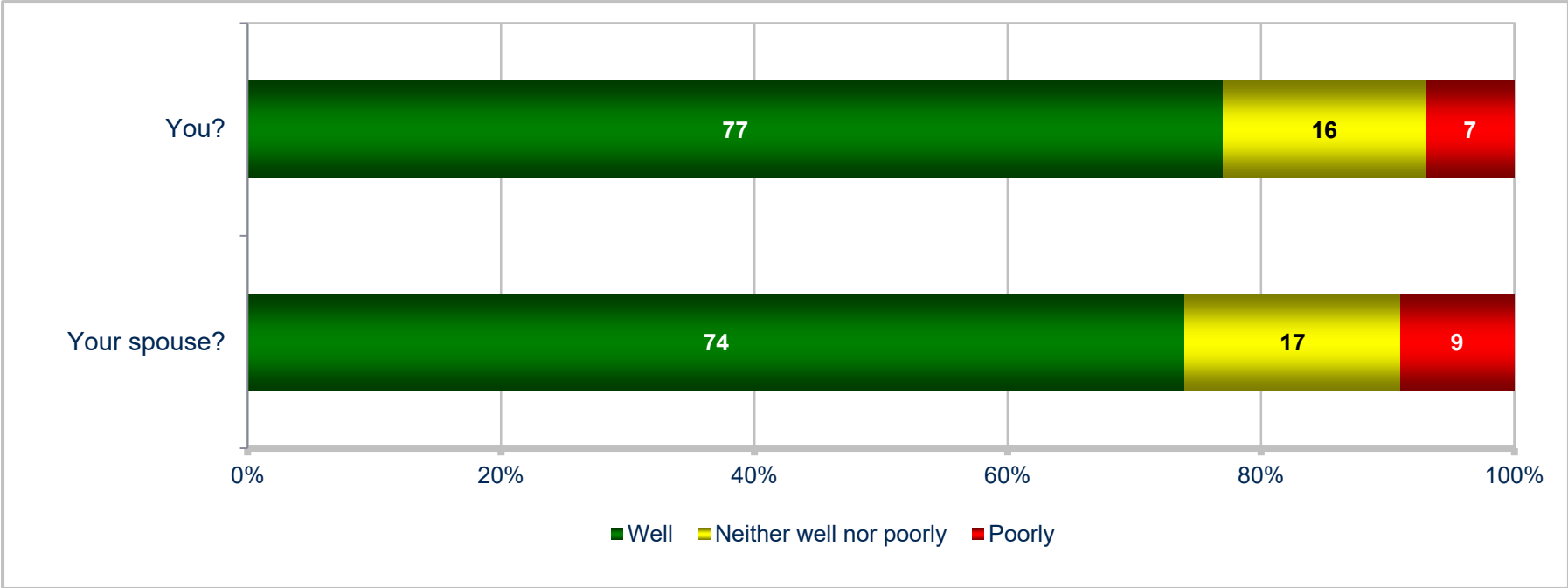
Reunion and Reintegration

Trends: Reunion and Reintegration

- **Majority of spouses reported reunion was going “well”** for them (77%) and husband/wife (74%) following return from deployment
- **The Yellow Ribbon Reintegration Program** was the most **frequently cited support service** used following member's return from deployment

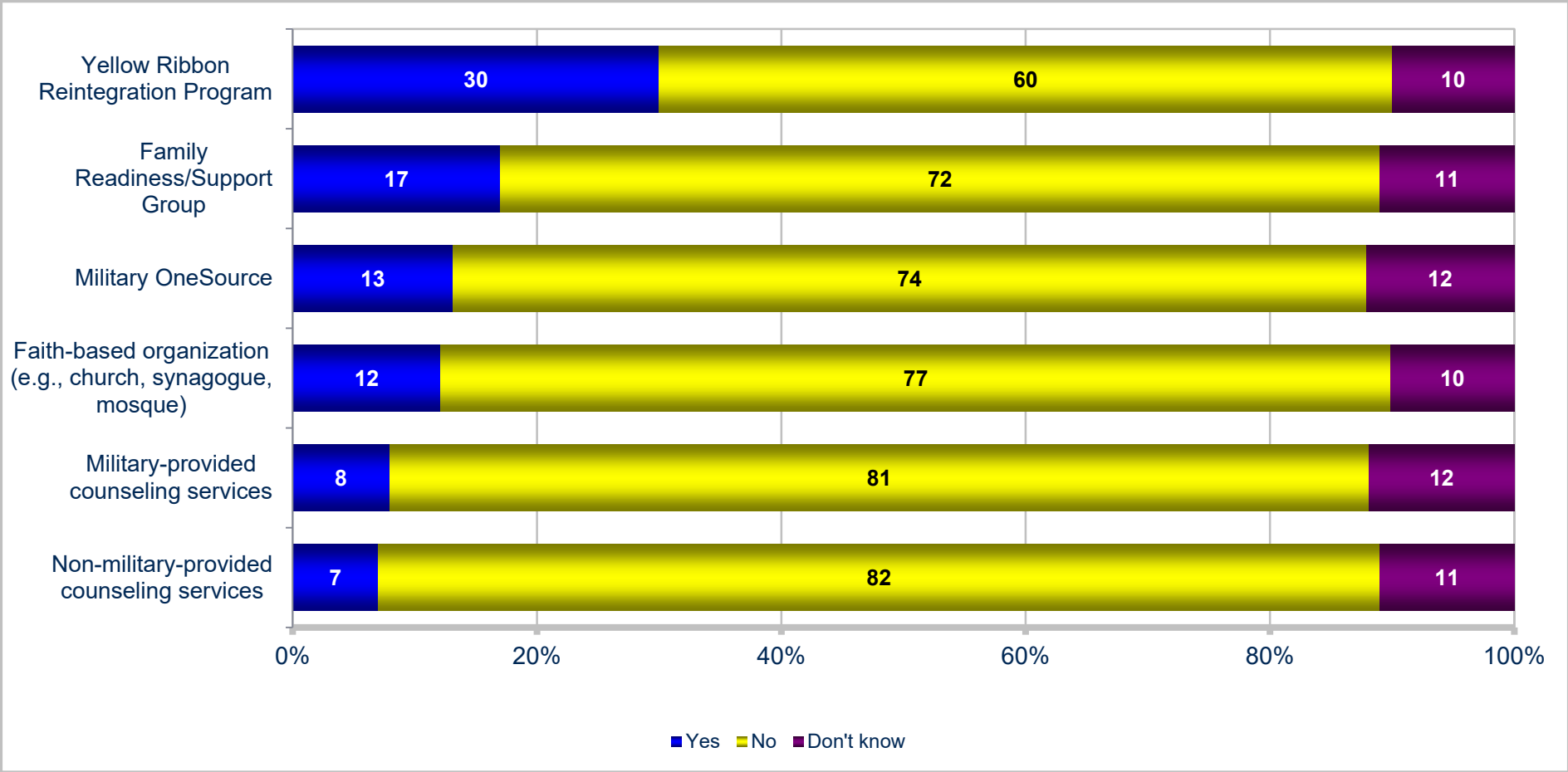

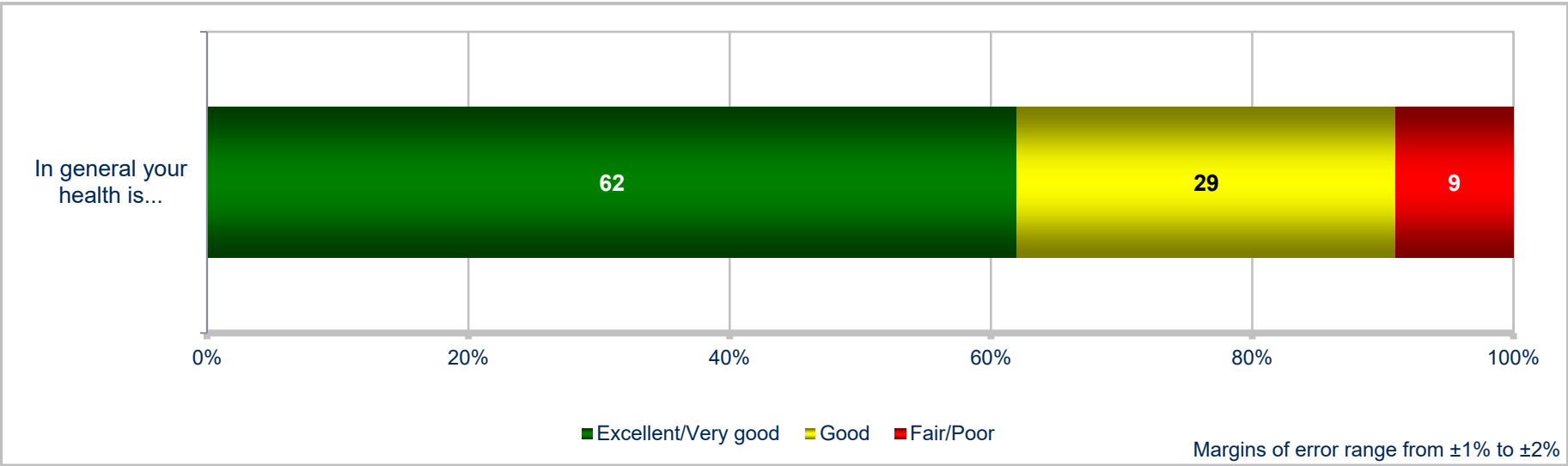
Spouse and Child Well-Being

Trends: Spouse and Child Well-Being

- **15% of spouses rated their level of personal stress as higher** than usual in 2019 - this percentage has not changed since 2014
- **Six in ten spouses rated general health as good/excellent**
- **Average level of distress among military spouses in 2019 was 2.0** on a scale of 0 to 12
- **Half of spouses (49%) reported their child's behavior at home was impacted by their spouse's deployment**

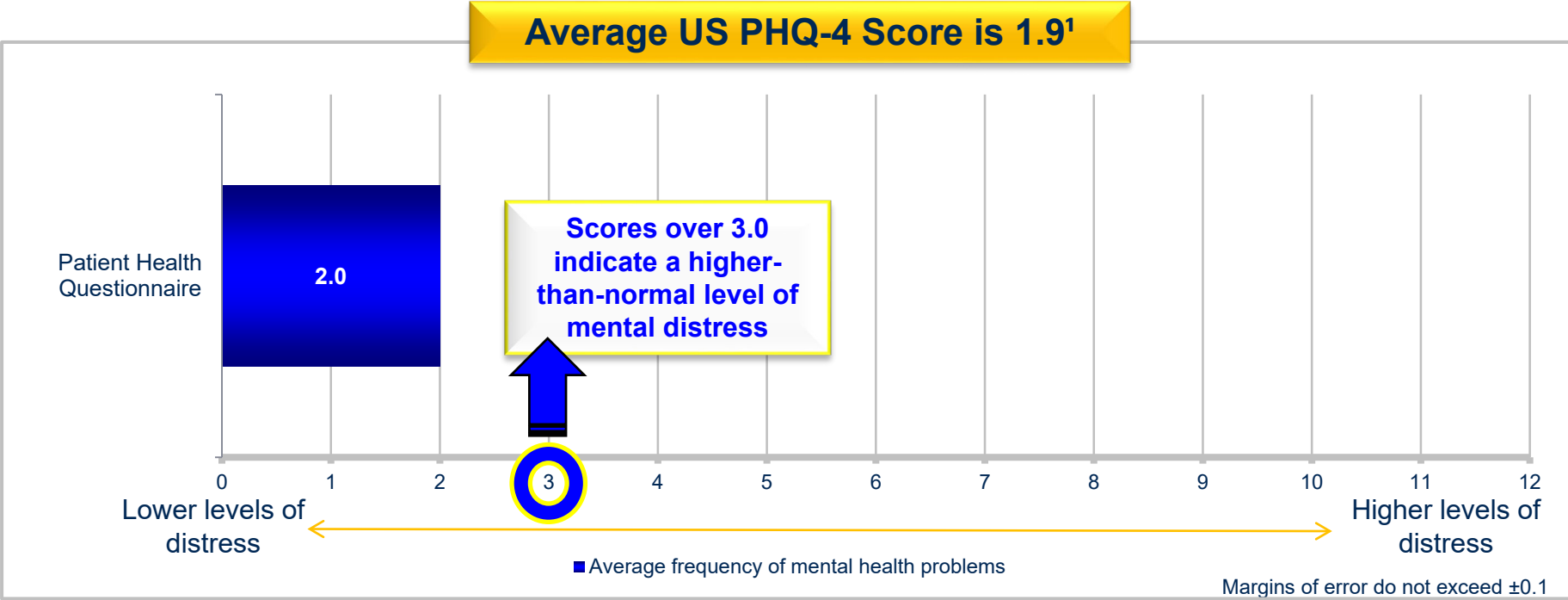

Patient Health Questionnaire (PHQ-4)

Average Summary Score of All Reserve Spouses



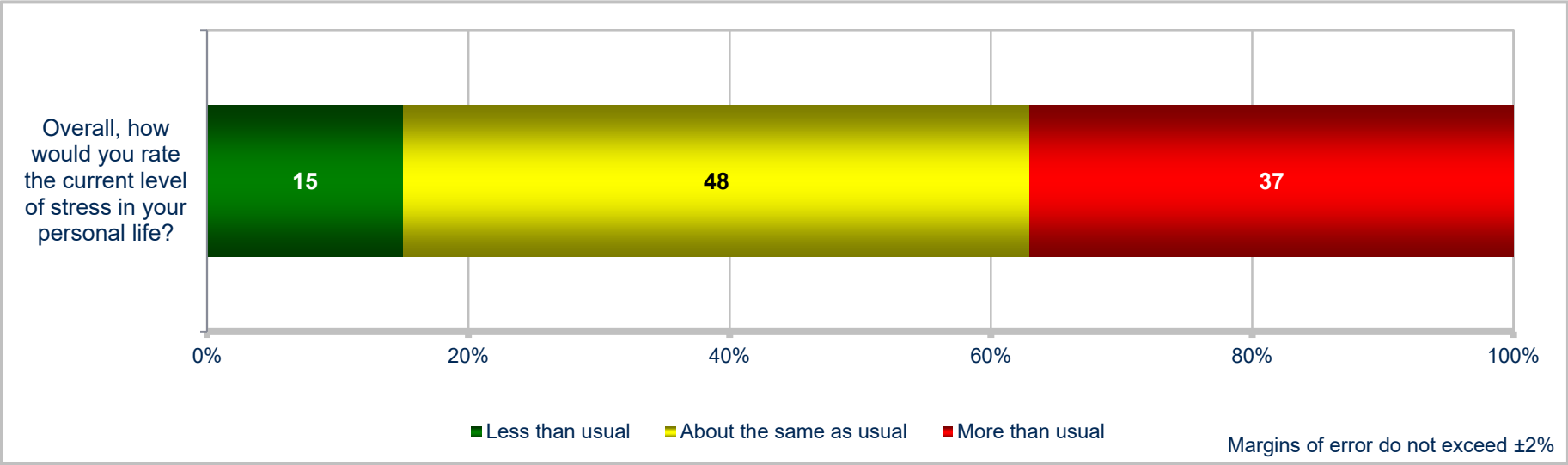
- Average PHQ-4 summary score **higher than DoD average** – ARNG (2.3); E1-E4 (2.4); E5-E9 (2.2)
- Average PHQ-4 summary score **lower than DoD average** – ANG (1.8); USAFR (1.4); O4-O6 (1.3)

Note: The timeframe given for response is “over the last two weeks.” Each item on the PHQ-4 is rated on a 0 to 3 scale. Overall PHQ-4 scores are reported as a single figure, which is the sum of the scores across all 4 items (range = 0-12). A higher total score indicates a higher likelihood of mental distress, marked by depression and anxiety. Clinical norms are as follows: 0-2 = normal range, 3-5 = mild distress, 6-8 = moderate distress, and 9-12 = severe distress. [Reference: Kroenke, K., Spitzer, R. L., Williams, J. B. W., & Lowe, B. 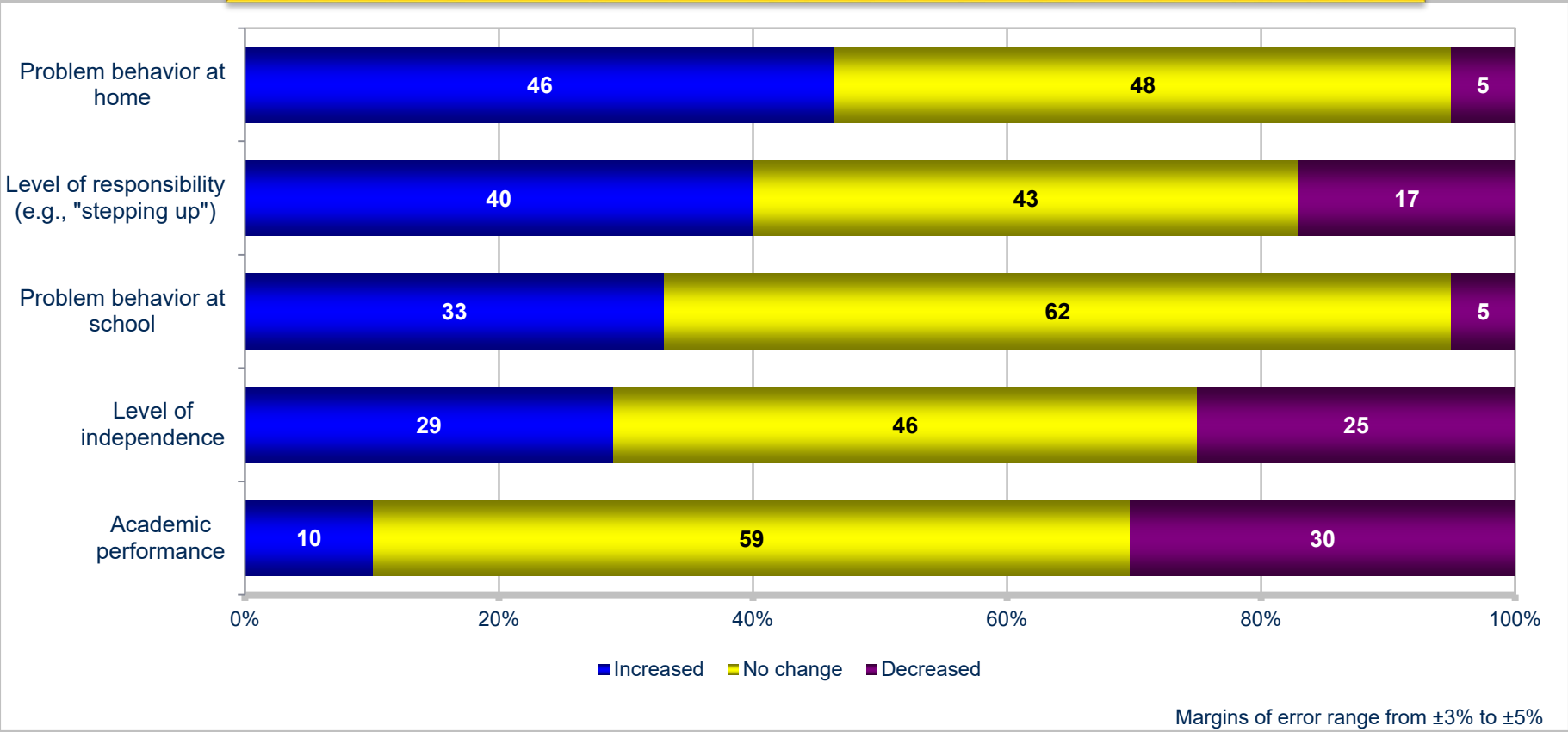

Behavioral Changes Most Impacted Child Experienced in Response to Deployment

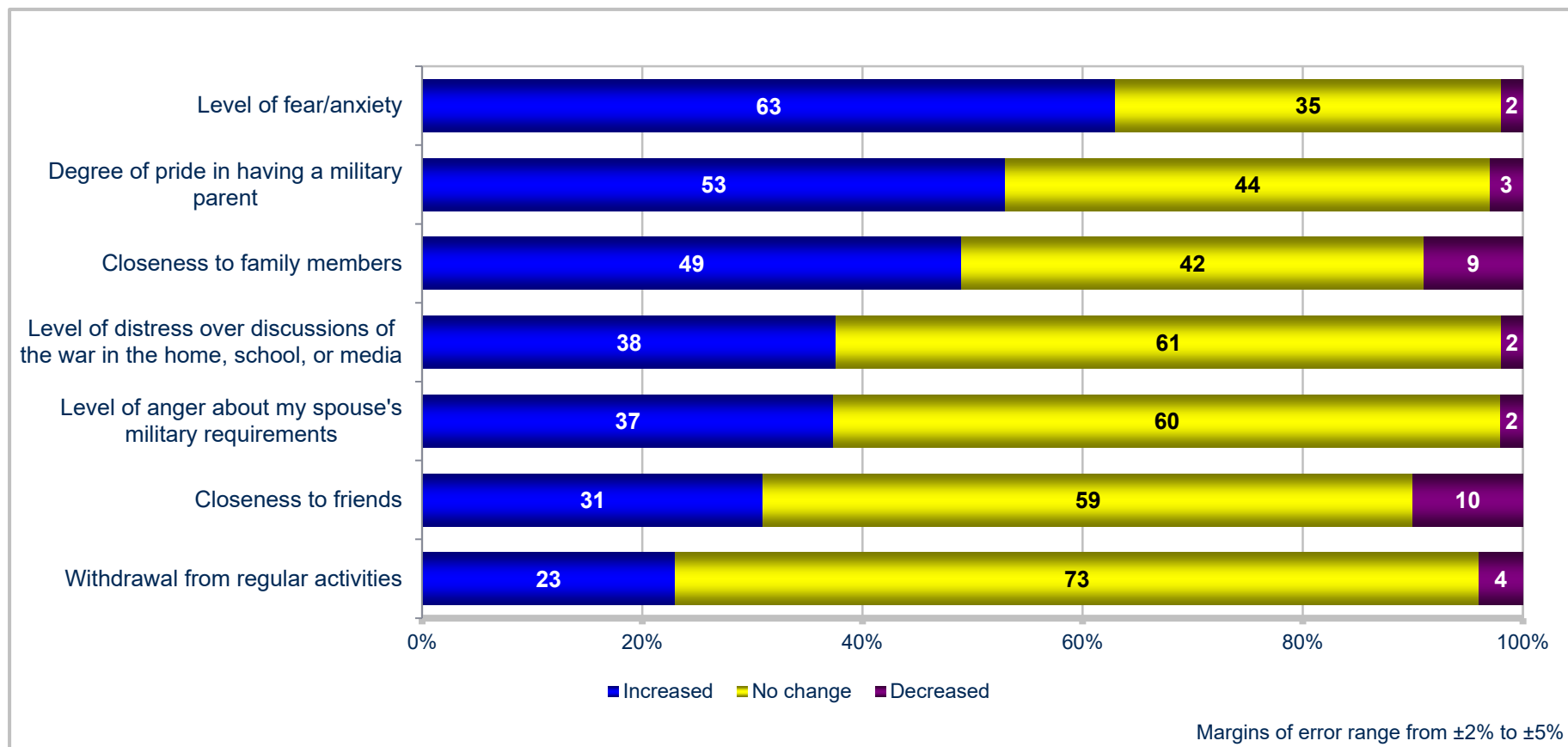

Emotional Changes Most Impacted Child Experienced in Response to Deployment

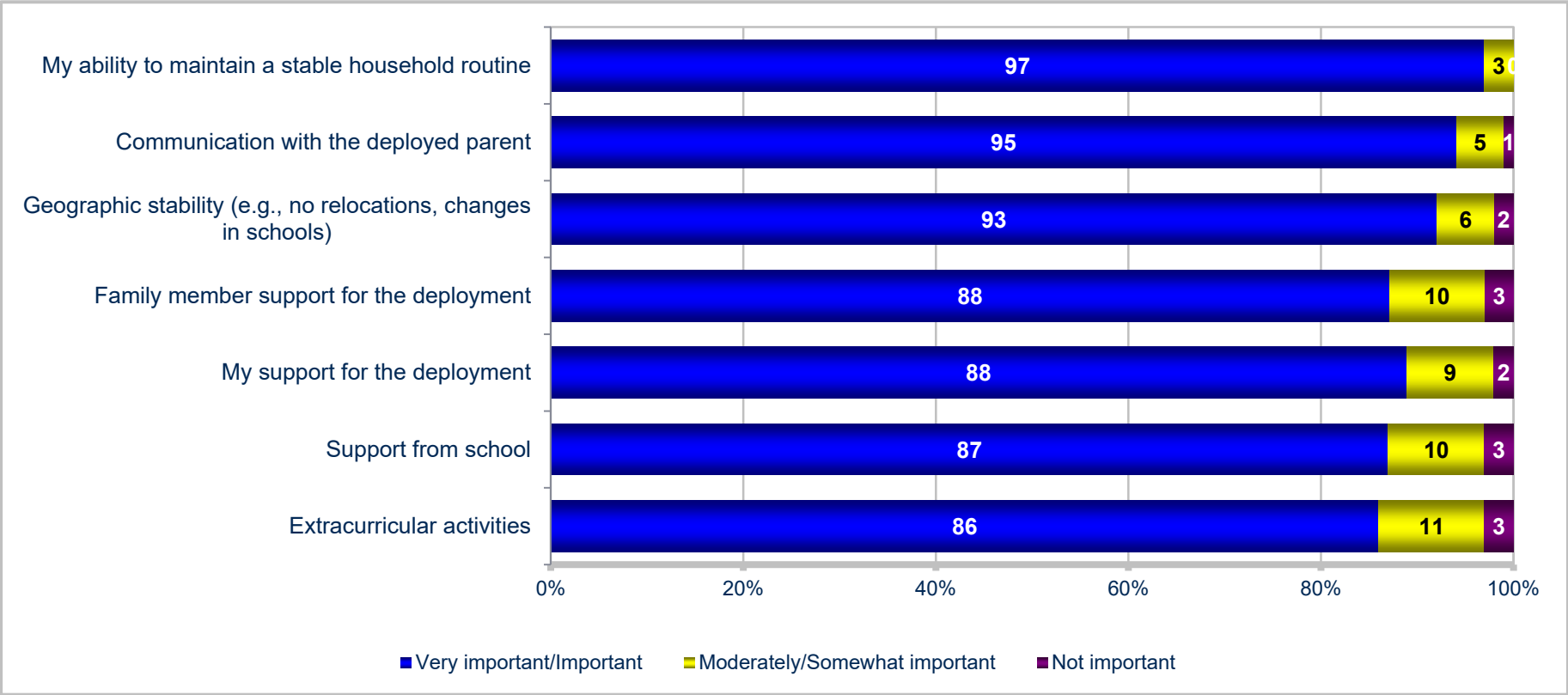

- Higher response of *Very important/Important* for:
